The HFR reserve has been successfully saved, the Bellbird Dell vegetation has been vastly improved, Gardens for Wildlife was started in Whitehorse and is now an ongoing program due to community support, the program is also successfully being rolled out across Victoria having a positive and beneficial impact on habitat improvement on private land. I was able to save a total of \$100,000 for two Owners Corporations by identifying incorrect billing, it took two years and forensic examination of documents to prove it and have it accepted by the responsible company. This is to list some of the benefits I have been able to make to groups I have been involved with.

I want urgent, meaningful effective action on Climate change, to support the community and business deal with the impact of COVID.
