



Activity Centres Program

After the delivery of the 10 Activity Centre Program Pilot centres, an additional 50 centres were identified for future growth and additional homes.

These centres were chosen based on:

- Existing and future public transport capacity – including opportunities created by Big Build projects
- Market viability
- Access to opportunities and services
- Environmental considerations

The 50 Train and Tram Zone Activity Centres will provide capacity for more than 300,000 additional homes by 2051, giving more Victorians the choice of a home that's close to public transport.

PHASE 1 ENGAGEMENT: Understanding place

Phase 1 sought to understand what local communities valued about their local areas.

Engagement activities included: an online survey, online Q&A sessions and community drop-in events.

A CRG was held for each Activity Centre cluster to review Phase 1 community feedback and make recommendations about community needs and preferences. PHASE 2 ENGAGEMENT: Seeking more input as we finalise our plans

Phase 2 engagement sought feedback on draft height and catchment maps.

Activity Centres Program



The vision is for taller buildings in the immediate 'core' where the train station and built-up commercial centre is located.



'Deemed to Comply' provisions apply in the Built Form Overlay.




In the 'catchments' (Housing Choice & Transport Zone) within a 10 minute walk surrounding this core, the vision is for scaled height limits and more low-rise apartments and townhouses alongside existing homes.



Public notification/appeal rights


- removed from the Built Form Overlay, which also removes 3rd party appeal rights
- Appeal rights are removed in the Housing Choice & Transport Zone


- Oct 2024 50 New Activity Centres, locations for 25
- Included Blackburn, Nunawading & Mitcham
- Feb 2025 Additional 25 centres announced, including 'city wide' (Yarra & Melbourne)
- Core building heights of 3-12 storeys, applied through new 'Built Form Overlay'
- 'Housing Choice & Transport
 Zone' up to 10 mins walk
 surrounding the core with scaled
 height limits and low-rise
 apartments & townhouses



Activity Centres Program

- 10 Pilot Centres, 60,000 new homes
- A replicable way to plan activity centres
- New planning tools released

Phase 1 community engagement

Phase 1 consultation will commence mid October through to November 2025

Purpose:

- To inform the community about the Train and Tram Zone Activity Centres Program
- To provide meaningful opportunities for community to provide feedback about things and places they value in their local area.

Activities will include:

- 2 x community drop-in sessions per cluster
- 2 x walk by activations per cluster
- 1 x online QA session per cluster
- An online survey



New planning controls

Activity Centre Core

- Applies new Built Form Overlay
- Existing underlying zoning with deemed to comply heights, removing notice and review.

Catchments

- Applies new Housing Choice and Transport Zone.
- Replaces existing residential zones around core.
- Higher building heights permitted on sites of over 1,000sqm.



The Core

The Activity Centre core is where higher built form will be located. This area represents excellent access to opportunities, often located within the core. This is the area where the *typologies*, the *Housing Growth Index* and Built Form Overlay (BFO) will apply.

The Catchment

The catchment surrounds the core and aims to guide more housing to areas in walking proximity to transport and services. The catchment provides a transition in built form from the higher buildings in the core to the existing residential areas. This is the area where the Housing Choice and Transport Zone (HCTZ) will apply to residential land.

Infrastructure Approach

Public realm, community facilities and transport opportunities have been identified throughout the core and the catchment areas. Opportunities to leverage existing and future infrastructure and identify potential projects to support more housing have been highlighted.

1. Urban design principles identified 2. Foundational analysis, including consideration of Council strategies and application of typologies

3. Identify and apply housing growth index 4. Local variations testing – application based on specific constraints and scope
